NINETY TWO OIL MEN ARE INDICTED

PENITENTIARY REMOVAL DEFEATED WHEN SENATE DELAYS ITS ACTION

Reconsideration of Quo Warranto Bill By House Possible As Result of Action Taken Today; Several Additional Appropriation Bills In the Senate Today.

(By Associated Press.)

AUSTIN, April 20.—The recommendation of the joint legislative committee of the regular session that the State penitentiary be removed to Central Texas was virtually defeated today when the Senate voted to postpone consideration of the report until the question of the prison legislation submitted by the governor to the special session is settled. Members opposing the recommendations said it is likely the governor will submit the matter, since he recommended to the regular session the concentration of the prison on an east Texas farm.

The judicial district committee today reported favorably the Burkett bill providing for the creation of the eleventh Court of Civil Appeals at Eastland.

To Reconsider Vote.

Because he is convinced that there is a joker in the proceedings on the quo warranto bill yesterday, Representative Burmeister today gave notice that he would move to reconsider the vote on which the measure was finally passed. His motion that the bill not be sent to the Senate until a motion to reconsider is disposed of was adopted.

For Prison Survey.

A resolution by Teer, authorizing a scientific survey of the Texas prison system by a national organization engaged in prison work for a modern and efficient prison system, was adopted by the House.

Bills introduced in the Senate today included one by Ridgeway proposing an appropriation of \$100,000 for additions to the Carlisle sanatorium; by Wood, an emergency appropriation of \$270,000; by Wood, a deficiency appropriation of \$15,400; by Fairchild, altering the punishment provisions of the State prohibition law.

COTTON GIN INVENTOR HEAD OF CONTINENTAL GIN COMPANY IS DEAD

NATIVE OF TEXAS AND PROMINENT IN GINNING INDUSTRY FOR MANY YEARS.

BIRMINGHAM, April 20.—R. S. Munger, inventor and philanthropist, died at his home here early today after an illness extending over a period of several weeks. He invented the Munger system of cotton ginning and at the time of his death was vice president of the Continental Gin Company which controls many of his patents. Munger's invention stopped the laborious process of unloading cotton by hand, the suction system being designed to take the place of the hand labor. He was a native of Fayette county, Texas.

Prominent Leader Irish Republican Forces Is Captured

DUBLIN, April 20.—Con Meany, one of the most prominent remaining leaders of the irregulars, was arrested yesterday by a party of national troops, it was announced today. His was considered one of the most important captures made in Cork county. Con Meany participated in many ambushes against the British forces.

FORT WORTH, April 20.—Frank Cramer, 14 years old, died here last night as a result of an injury received last Friday in a baseball game. He was struck in the abdomen by a pitched ball, rupturing the appendix.

EXPLOSION KILLS FOUR.

SATURDAY WILL BE A BIG DAY IN BROWNWOOD

SOMETHING DOING EVERY MINUTE OF THE DAY IF RAIN DOESN'T INTERFERE.

SATURDAY—San Jacinto Day—will be a big day in Brownwood. If it doesn't rain.

And if it rains, there will be a lot of disappointed people in Brownwood and Brown county. For throughout the county tomorrow has been advertised as the day of the big parade, the day of the big baseball game, the day of the ex-service men's barbecue and banquet, and above all else, the day of the great historical pageant, "Texas Under Six Flags." Incidentally, it is the day which Texas celebrates as the anniversary of the battle of San Jacinto, in which General Sam Houston and his brave Texas followers knocked General Santa Anna and his Mexicans into a row of cactus plants and paved the way for Texas independence, away back yonder in eighteen hundred and thirty-six.

Review of Texas History.

The pageant, "Texas Under Six Flags," will be the crowning event of an extended day—if it doesn't rain. For several weeks the pupils of the Brownwood schools, from the tiny tots to the brightly seniors of the High School, have been rehearsing for this event, and the town and county has been raved and scoured for bits of clothing which can be converted into costumes for the Spanish explorers, the Indians, the Sam Houston, and Davy Crockett who are to take part in the several episodes of the out-door spectacle. Mrs. Willie Jenkins Miller has been directing the preparation of the pageant. It will begin with scenes showing how, a hundred years ago, Spanish explorers came into Texas and established missions and otherwise began the civilizing of the great territory now known as Texas. Then will follow scenes showing the early days Indians, the early settlers, the conflict with the Mexican, the stirring scene of the revolution that brought independence from Mexico; then will come the Civil War period, and other scenes will bring the history up to the present day.

The pageant will be the most magnificent spectacle of the kind ever staged in Central Texas, and will be the greatest out-door entertainment ever shown in Brownwood. It is expected to attract to the city thousands of people from all over Brown and surrounding counties, where extensive advertising has been placed by the committees in charge.

Other Events of the Day.

The day's celebration will begin at 10 o'clock Saturday morning—if it doesn't rain—with a big street parade. Included among the several entries will be a number of entries by local merchants, designed to present the several episodes which will be presented on an elaborate scale in the pageant of the evening. The parade will also include decorated automobiles and trucks, and entries by the rural schools of the county.

In the afternoon, at 2:30, there will be a double header baseball game—if it doesn't rain. Daniel Baker and Simmons Colleges will play two games, which were postponed on account of bad weather and prospects for rain Monday and Tuesday of this week.

Rain Can't Stop This.

At 6 o'clock in the evening, all ex-service men of the county who are able to display an American Legion membership card will meet at the Sanitary bakery for a barbecue banquet. This is one event of the day's program that will not be stopped by rain, for the ex-soldiers defy the rain to present their answering the message. The banquet will end by 8:00 o'clock, so that it will not conflict with the pageant scheduled to begin at that hour, provided it hasn't rained by that time.

The merchants will keep their places of business open as usual throughout Saturday, for the accommodation of the crowds of people who will come here to participate in the day's celebration, but will close their stores at 7 p. m. so that everybody

GETTING MIGHTY UNCOMFORTABLE



SCHOOL BOARD APPEALS FOR MORE SUPPORT

ENLARGED FACILITIES AND GREATER FINANCIAL SUPPORT NEEDED, BOARD SAYS.

SUMMARIZING the financial difficulties confronting the Brownwood Public Schools, and pleading with the citizens to support the proposed bond issues for school building purposes and the charter amendments providing for more liberal financial support of the schools, the Board of Trustees of the Brownwood Schools has prepared a statement relative to the schools and their needs. The statement is signed by D. F. Johnson, president; L. J. Rice, vice president; Fannie L. Gully, Elizabeth Tottenham, W. A. Roussel, H. M. Hughes and Jewell A. Johnson, members of the Board.

The statement of the Board of Trustees points out that the state appropriation for the public schools will be less next year than this year, and emphasizes the opinion of the Board that the increased school tax levy proposed in the charter amendments is urgently needed in order that the city's schools may maintain their accredited standing in the state's educational system. The statement, in full, is as follows:

"On May the fifth the citizens of Brownwood will be called upon to go to the polls and vote for a bond issue for the completion of a Junior High School and for an amendment to our City Charter, which will grant a ten-cent additional tax rate for maintaining our Public Schools. As your Board of Trustees we desire to place before you the school situation as it really confronts us and ask that you give this matter your thoughtful consideration before casting your vote for or against the bond issue, or the amendments to the City Charter and especially those amendments which pertain to the welfare of our schools.

Hand-to-Mouth Policy.

"We have been forced to pursue a sort of hand-to-mouth policy in handling the affairs of the schools on account of the rapidly increasing numbers and a lack of funds with which we might adequately take care of the increased expenses which have come along with the phenomenal growth of our schools. We believe that as citizens you are reasonably acquainted with the over-crowded conditions of the schools and the imperative need of additional room to take care of our greatly increased enrollment. The graded schools are badly congested in spots and the high school has reached an enrollment of about eight hundred students, which we all know is really double the number that can be pro-

STRONG OPPOSITION TO HARDING PLAN FOR WORLD COURT VOICED

CONGRESSIONAL CAMPAIGN CHAIRMAN ADVISES PRESIDENT TO DROP PLAN.

(By Associated Press.)

WASHINGTON, April 20.—Expressing the belief that the Republican opposition to the administration's world court membership proposal is even stronger than that against American entrance into the League of Nations, Representative Wood of Indiana, chairman of the Republican congressional campaign committee, today told President Harding that he believed it was a mistake for the party to urge the proposition.

This constitutes the first open opposition to Harding's proposal among Republican leaders outside the irreconcilable group.

PRISONER ADMITS HE KILLED FRITZI MANN CALIFORNIA DANCER

POTTERY MANUFACTURER TO PAY BIG FINE IN ADDITION TO JAIL TERM.

NEW YORK, April 20.—A. M. Maddox, president of Thomas Maddox Sons Company of Trenton, New Jersey, one of the twenty persons convicted with twenty-three pottery manufacturing companies for conspiracy in restraint of trade, was sentenced by Federal Judge Vandelet today to serve ten months in jail and pay a fine of five thousand dollars.

Larger Acreage Principal Crops Shown in Report

WASHINGTON, April 20.—A special report on the acreage of the principal farmers intend to plant this year was made today by the Department of Agriculture, including: Cotton, 112 per cent of the 1922 acreage; spring wheat, 94.5 per cent; corn, 102.6 per cent; oats, 102.6 per cent of last year's acreage.

COMMUNISTS IN MUELHEIM ARE PUT TO FLIGHT

SANGUINARY STRUGGLE RESULTS IN RECAPTURE OF CITY BY REGULAR POLICE.

(By Associated Press.)

MUELHEIM, April 20.—After being terrorized for three days by the communist mobs which held it, Muelheim today is again under the control of the constituted German authorities. A force of three hundred police and city officials which were besieged in the Rathaus, made a sortie from this fortress-like building today, cut through the line of besiegers, caught them in the rear and arrested many afterwards taking control of the city.

Eight Persons Slain.

Berlin, April 20.—Eight persons so far are reported dead, and more than thirty are wounded as a result of the disturbances in Muelheim, according to a dispatch this noon this stated that although the city has been freed from the grip of the communists, armed bands are still causing much trouble in the outskirts of the city.

Texas Highway Association Is Convened at Waco

German Unemployed Threaten to Apply to French for Work

LONDON, April 20.—A dispatch to the Times from Duesseldorf says the unemployed council there is reported to have informed the Berlin government that unless the conditions of the 30,000 unemployed are improved they will volunteer to work for the French.

OVER TWO MILLION STOCKHOLDERS IN CONCERNS CHARGED WITH FRAUD

Merger of Hundreds of Companies and Sales of Stock Running Into Many Millions Charged By United States Attorney in Statement Today.

PRAIRIE PIPE LINE ENTERS LOCAL FIELD

CONTRACT CLOSED BETWEEN BIG COMPANY AND PRODUCERS OF BROWN COUNTY THURSDAY.

(By Associated Press.)

A Thursday evening by the terms of which the Prairie Pipe Line Company, headquarters at Independence, Kansas, will extend its pipe line system into the field of Brown county, the great gathering station to be located on the Marion (Tex.) land in the north Brown county field.

The parties of the second part to this big contract which means so much to the industrial life and progress not only of Brownwood and Brown county but the entire central west and southwest Texas area, are the oil operators and owners of producing wells in the Brown county area, and this includes all shallow and deep well areas. The building of this big line means that the oil of Brown county will be delivered directly to the great refineries of the Prairie Gas & Oil company at Whiting, Indiana, and Bayonne, New Jersey. But the outstanding feature, and the one valued most, perhaps, by the producers of Brown county is that Brown county is finally recognized as an important factor in the great oil producing areas of the Southwest, not particularly so much at the present time, perhaps, but that there is a great and growing future, in the Brown county field and in order to be ready to handle the situation as it was developed by future events, the Prairie Pipe Line Company had decided to build into the field.

Signed by Sutton.

The contract for building the pipe line was signed on the part of the company by William H. Sutton, who represented the producing end of the Prairie Oil & Gas Company, and the deal was consummated in the office of W. D. Gully, the producers of Brown county being present, and also Mr. Dumree, who is field superintendent of the Prairie Pipe Line Company, in this area.

Engineers who will have charge of laying out the right-of-way and placing the pipe line in position, left Brownwood Friday morning, and are today at work on the preliminaries in the field.

After signing the contract which calls for the building of the line at the earliest possible date Mr. Sutton assured the producers that the bringing of the pipe line into Brown county was, in his opinion, one of the most important events that has ever happened in this part of the country. It places Brown county squarely on the oil producing map, and assures the producers of marketing facilities not excelled anywhere in the United States. It means further development of the local field on a larger scale, perhaps, than has ever been attempted.

With Mr. Sutton at Brownwood where Mrs. Sutton, Mrs. Sutton's mother, Mr. and Mrs. Dumree and while the gentlemen on the party attended to the business in connection with signing the pipe line contract the ladies put in the time shopping, in which several hundred dollars were spent, and after which their unanimous expression was, that Brownwood was certainly an ideal place in which to shop, and they were delighted with the many courtesies that had been shown them.

Charles E. Sutton, brother of William H. Sutton was also a Brownwood visitor yesterday, and left this morning for Amarillo, where he has closed a contract which calls for placing a pipe line from the Amarillo gas fields to Colorado Springs, and Denver, Colorado, involving a cost of \$14,000,000. The gas contract includes 250,000 acres of land in the Amarillo gas area.

WOULD ENTER THE LEAGUE.

GENEVA, April 20.—The Irish Free State has applied for membership in the League of Nations.

FORT WORTH, April 20.—Ninety-two oil promoters were indicted by the federal grand jury today on charges of using the mails to defraud. The oil companies involved in the indictments have taken over seven million dollars in cash, and into three companies were merged four hundred and fifty-eight companies which had sold \$136,000,000 in stock.

United States District Attorney Henry Zweifel declared the investigation disclosed that approximately 2,064,000 persons were stockholders in the merged companies and the companies named in the indictments.

Prominent Men Included.

Among those indicted, whose names were made public, were Marshall Spoons, former county attorney; E. C. Kingsbury, aspirant and Republican choice for the Fort Worth postmaster; Dr. Frederick Cook, sole trustee and president of the Petroleum Producers Association; S. E. J. Cox, aviator-oil man, an employee of the Petroleum Producers Association; and J. W. Carruth, trustee of the Hog Creek-Carruth Company.

Those indicted also included John Verser and Albert Sheppard, the secretary-treasurer and vice president of the Revere Oil Company.

Many Investors Involved.

According to the post office inspectors, there were 313 companies merged into the Dector Cook company, and were capitalized for \$388,861,000. They sold \$90,000,000 in stock. The Revere company merged 125 companies with a capital stock of \$191,000,000, and the stock sold amounted to \$39,000,000, according to the inspectors. The Pilgrim Oil Company merged twenty companies which sold \$7,000,000 in stock, it was said.

In making public the figures District Attorney Zweifel said the investigation showed there was an average of one stockholder for every \$100 of stock sold, and this would give 704,450 investors in the companies named in the indictments, about 1,003,600 investors in the merged companies, or a total of 2,064,450 persons in all the companies.

PRISON SENTENCE IS GIVEN ON CONVICTION FOR RESTRAINT TRADE

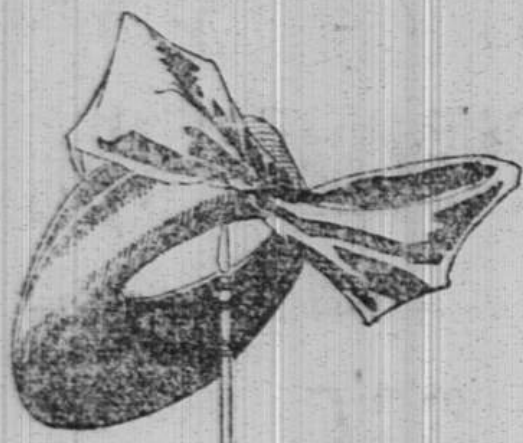

REVIVAL IN COLLEGE IS BEGINNING TO GET STUDENT CONVERSIONS

NO FURTHER SERVICES UNTIL
SUNDAY MORNING WILL BE
HELD BY DR. WILKS.

The revival at Howard Payne College is beginning to get results. Already, there have been many re-consecrations and one profession, and judging from the interest being taken in every service, the results are going to be all that could be expected.

At the evening service Thursday, Dr. Wilks gave an expository message on the likenesses and differences of the five wise and the five foolish virgins. He said in part: "All these virgins were alike in many respects. They were all headed in the same direction, were all supplied with lamps for making light, and all had received an invitation. More than this, all went to sleep, all were awakened, and all had good intentions. But, there was this difference—the foolish had outward show without inward preparation. So, the same door that shut the wise virgins in shut the foolish virgins out."

Friday morning Dr. Wilks continued his messages on the Book of Exodus, speaking on "The Greatest Miracle in the Book." As an introduction, the speaker said: "The miraculous element in the Bible has been the center of assault by those who would destroy our faith. Some have attempted to bring the miracles into disrepute by attempts to explain the miracles by saying that the miracle workers simply understood natural laws and took advantage of them. But this discredits the miracle itself. There is no natural law that cannot be overcome by a higher law. The natural law is that water will seek its level but a higher law of life operates to carry water to the top of the highest tree. But the greatest miracle in this Book, is the miracle of slaying the first-born

of the Egyptians and saving the first-born of the Israelites, where the blood was on the door."

In connection with the relation of this miracle to salvation through Jesus, Dr. Wilks said: "There are several 'lamb' about this lamb of the Passover. It must be a lamb. No other animal could take its place. It must be without blemish. So with Christ. His judge said, 'I find no fault in Him.' H. G. Wells put Jesus at the head of the greatest men of history. The lamb must be slain. Some object the five wise and the five foolish virgins not afford to see us die when his suffering and death would save us. The blood of the slain lamb must be applied. On the sides and top of the door the blood must be found or the destroying angel would slay the first-born. This is emblematic of the cross of Christ. But some will ask, 'If Christ died, is not the whole world saved?' No; the blood must be applied by faith, and God says, 'When I see the blood, I will pass over you.'"

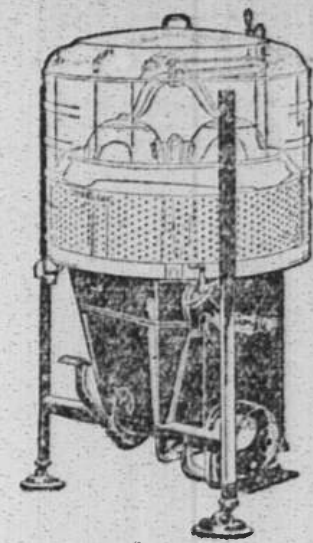
Dr. Wilks closed with an appeal to the unsaved to accept the finished work of redemption, let the blood be applied through faith and accept the promise of Christ when He said, "Him that cometh to me I will in no wise cast out."

Recipes

Mocha Frosting and Filling.
1-2 cup washed or unsalted butter.
1-2 cups confectioner's sugar.
1-2 tablespoons strong coffee infusion.

Work butter until creamy and add sugar gradually, while stirring constantly, adding the coffee during the process, a few drops at a time.

Chocolate Mocha Frosting.—To Mocha Frosting add two tablespoons of breakfast cocoa.

Nut Mocha Frosting.—Add to Mocha Frosting finely ground roasted filberts and pink coloring.

Spring Vegetable Shortcake.
A delicious lunch dish may be made by baking rich baking-powder crust in a round in two half-inch layers, brushing the bottom one with melted butter before putting on the top.

At serving time lift top, butter well, and fill with cooked asparagus tips; carrots and peas; asparagus and peas, or any preferred combination of the spring vegetables, moistened very liberally with cream sauce—all very hot. Replace top, brush with melted butter, and serve with garnish of a ring of very thinly sliced hard-boiled eggs over which a little melted and seasoned butter has been poured and which has been sprinkled with minced parsley.

In cooking the spring or other new vegetables use as little water as possible, cook gently instead of boiling hard, do not salt until nearly done—salting at first hardens them—and season liberally with good butter. Always save the water in which they are cooked for use in soups and sauces. The water in which the onions are cooked for instance, makes much more delicious gravy for the roast than plain water. Take great pains to obtain fresh vegetables, but if a little wilted, place in cold water for a while. Save the pea pods for soup. A tiny pinch of sugar when seasoning, to my mind, greatly improves all vegetables.

Asparagus and Peas.
Cut tender portion of one bunch of asparagus into inch pieces, cook gently with fresh peas. Drain, combine with half a teaspoonful each of sugar and salt, one tablespoonful of butter and two tablespoonfuls of heavy cream. Serve very hot.

THE QUO WARRANTO
BILL.

THE HOUSE has finally passed the
quo warranto bill, providing for
the removal of officers who are proven
derelict in the performance of their
duties. It is the same bill, in all es-
sential respects, which was defeated
in the regular session of the Legisla-
ture. It provides that the Attorney
General and the Governor shall have
authority to institute proceedings for
the removal of any officer who shall
appear to have failed or refused to
perform his duties in the enforce-
ment of the law, and provides for the
trial of such accused officer in a coun-
ty other than that of the defendant's
residence.

The quo warranto bill is a product
of the insistence of the Governor that
the law enforcement officers of the
State are not performing their duty.
Since the beginning of his adminis-
tration the Governor has been charg-
ing the sheriffs and other enforcement
officers of the state with gross dereliction
of duty, and has been telling
the people that there is open viola-
tion of the law in scores of commu-
nities. To remedy this alleged evil,
the Governor has proposed that the
executive of the state and the state
Attorney General be authorized to in-
stitute proceedings for the removal
of officers thought to be derelict in the
performance of their duties, and his
insistence upon such legislation has
brought about the passage by the
House of the so-called quo warranto
measure.

One of the principal objections to
the quo warranto bill is that it will
make it possible for persons who so
desire to give honest and faithful offi-
cers a great deal of unnecessary trou-
ble in the performance of their du-
ties, and will lay down the bars to po-
litical persecution of officers through-
out the state. Another objection is
that the law centralized in Austin too
much authority to meddle in the af-
fairs of the counties and of local com-
munities. A third objection is that
the existing statutes make ample pro-
vision for the removal of unfaithful
officers. That the existing laws do not
make provision for the removal of in-
efficient officers is well, perhaps, inas-
much as the law enforcement officers
are chosen by direct vote of the peo-
ple, and provision for the reversal of
the people's decision by the state's
executive on the ground that the peo-
ple had chosen unwisely would not
be contrary to the principles of
Democratic government.

As a matter of fact, the Governor
has made a great deal of noise about
alleged violations of the law, but has
done nothing to give the people cause
to believe he was correctly informed
as to such alleged violations. He has
declined to place any evidence, if any
he possessed, in the hands of grand
juries in counties in which he claimed
there were violations of the law, and
has taken no definite steps as the
state's chief executive to see that the
laws are respected. If he made his
charges of gross violation of the law
in good faith, he has shown bad faith
in not taking every step possible un-
der existing laws to see that such vi-
olations were stopped. The enactment
of additional law enforcement meas-
ures should be deferred until all ex-
isting laws relating to the subject had
been tried and found ineffectual.

A TEXAS PAGEANT.

THE PAGEANT, "Texas Under Six
Flags," which is to be given here
on Saturday night by the Brownwood
High School, will be a review of a
hundred years of Texas history—a
history more glorious than that of any
other state in the Union and as dear
to the people of the Lone Star State
as is that of the United States itself.
Participating in the pageant will be
more than a thousand pupils of the
Brownwood public schools, and the
presentation of the several episodes
will come after days and weeks of re-
hearsal and preparation. Obviously,
such labor in such a worthy enter-
prise deserves the whole-hearted sup-
port of all the people.

This will be Brownwood's first ef-
fort to present on a big scale an out-
door pageant of this character. That
it is to be presented on the evening
of San Jacinto day—a holiday that
will always be celebrated in Texas in
memory of the history-making battle
fought on that day during the days
of Texas' struggle for independence—
gives the pageant even greater inter-
est than it would have if presented
at any other time. The Brownwood
High School is to be commended for
its enterprise in arranging the big un-
dertaking, and the gratitude and ap-
preciation of the people should be ap-
parent by the presence of a great
throne when the opening episode be-
gins Saturday night.

One of the important statements in
the brief filed by Coleman in its cam-
paign for the location of the Texas
Tech college was that Coleman county
has 185 miles of hard-surfaced high-
ways built and under construction. If
no other data were submitted to the
Locating Board, Coleman county would
be recognized as a progressive and
prosperous county.

erly cared for in our present high
school buildings.

"Our plan and aim has been to erect
a junior high school, having in mind
the relief of the crowded condition in
both the grades and in the present
high school by taking the seventh
grade students from the ward schools
and the first year students from the
present high school, which would
mean relief for many years to come
and certainly not the growing added
to the end of voting sixty thousand
dollars for the junior high school, we
have asked the City Council for a sink-
ing fund sufficient to take care of this
additional bonding capacity and the
Council has assured us that five cents
added to the sinking fund would be
sufficient. This added fund was ask-
ed in order that in the event of an
emergency our city would still have
sufficient bonding capacity to take
care of its every need. As for the
bonds to complete the junior high
school, we feel that the citizenship
will be glad to vote such bonds but
if the ten cent maintenance tax asked
for should be defeated it would mean
that we would have a building but no
money to pay teachers or to buy equip-
ment for such a building.

Reduced Apportionment.
The measures that the Board was
forced to take this year are generally
and well known and it is abundantly
evident to us all that our income for
the coming year will be less than this
year. It is true that we get sixty
cents for the schools next year where
we have received but fifty-five this.
But the fact that our State apportion-
ment next year will be at least three
dollars per child less than this year,
this decreased income from the State
will more than offset our increased
income from local taxation. Too, it
must not be forgotten that in a year
of the history of Brownwood have all
taxes for school purposes been col-
lected, but there is usually a consid-
erable difference between the taxes
that are actually collected and those
announced.

"Now if we assume that our income
for the next year should be equal to
that of this year, how will the in-
creased expenses be met out of this
same income? This year all depart-
ments of modern languages were
dropped from the schools and all man-
ual training work was discontinued
on account of a lack of funds with
which to pay teachers. We had hoped
that next year these departments
might be replaced in the schools for a
longer delay in restoring these de-
partments will mean a loss of state
recognition and affiliation which we
think would be no less than a real
calamity. It would mean the loss of all
that has been gained by years of con-
stant effort. We may say that it was
only with the assurance that every
effort would be made to return to the
schools the work that had been dis-
placed that we were able to keep our
affiliation this year. Longer delay
will, of course, be fatal. Too, after a
careful inspection of classes and
their crowding condition, it has been
recommended by the State Depart-
ment of Education that in order to re-
place what has been dropped from
the school and to take care of the
present attendance, at least eight
teachers must be added to the teach-

ing force, thereby making a total of
sixty-eight teachers. If our present
income is insufficient to run our
schools up to the standard of last
year, we readily appreciate the fact
that greater responsibilities could not
be met.

School Revenues.

"May we say that our actual col-
lections for local school purposes is only
a little above forty thousand dollars
and often times less than this amount
and our state apportionment for
Brownwood is about twenty-five thou-
sand dollars, a little more or a little
less, and out of these amounts ap-
proximately eighty-five per cent is
spent for fuel, insurance, permanent
improvements and school supplies. To
replace the departments in our
schools discontinued this year and to
add the teachers actually required to
teach the school, including principals
and on our present salary basis, at
least seventy-two thousand dollars
will be required in salaries. This will
represent about eighty-five per cent of
the funds actually needed for all pur-
poses or a total of eighty-five thousand
dollars.

"There seems to be a rumor going
the rounds that the state apportion-
ment for the coming year will not be
less than fifteen dollars per child but
this impression grew out of a state-
ment made by our State Superintendent
when he said that he would ask the
Legislature for this amount, but
neither Mr. Marrs nor any one else
believes that this will be realized.
How could it be possible to increase
the per capita apportionment with a
decreased income to that fund out of
which this apportionment will be
made which will actually be the case
next year. However, if such an effort
should succeed, the school board is
willing to pledge itself that only such
a part of the tax levy of ten cents, if
such should be voted, will be collect-
ed as is actually required. Certainly,
no more money will be collected than
must be used to finance the schools on
the most economical basis, but we do
feel that it would be a great loss to
the rating, standard and real efficiency
of our schools if the lost departments
cannot be restored and the needed
teachers cannot be added to teach our
boys and girls.

Courses Discontinued.

"It is now impossible for the stu-
dents of the Brownwood public schools
to get a modern language or for our
boys to get manual training and only
eighty-five of our high school girls out
of nearly five hundred are permitted

to get instruction in the Home Eco-
nomics Department. This means that
only a small per cent of our students
are getting what there is a real prac-
tical need and demand for and unless
an additional maintenance tax is given
we shall be forced to pursue the only
courses before us. This year it was
necessary to reduce our already low
salaries for teachers ten per cent in
addition to eliminating departments
from the school. This was unwise and
resulted in the loss of many of our
best teachers. The coming year,
without additional funds for operating
expenses, we shall have to again re-
duce salaries or reduce the length of
the school term or remain on our
pinched basis. To do any of these
things would mean, not only the loss
of our standing and affiliation, but it
would mean that our real efficiency
would be reduced to a minimum. It
would mean that our school system
would be just where it would all have
to be made over again in order to
meet the demands upon it.

"We submit these facts to you for
your careful consideration and await
your reply as to what is the wise thing
to do with our public schools."

IMPORTANT NEW CONSTRUCTION WORK

ROGERS LETS CONTRACT FOR STORE BUILDINGS TO REPLACE BURNED BLOCK

CONTRACT GOES TO A. C. BRATTON WHO HAS JUST RESIGNED AS CITY MANAGER.

R. B. Rogers late Thursday let a contract to A. C. Bratton for the construction of a building at the corner of Center avenue and Baker street, 126 feet on the former and 117 feet on the latter, to cost \$50,000 or more. Mr. Rogers had been working on the plans for the building for some time, and stated today that the work of construction will begin at once. The buildings will replace buildings destroyed on February 13, 1921, when the Rogers store and other mercantile establishments and the Dixie Theatre were destroyed by fire.

Mr. Rogers has leased practically all of the several new store rooms, and it is expected that the fifteen offices which will be provided on the second floor of a portion of the new building will be leased before the completion of the construction work. The corner building, 50x100 feet, at Center and Baker streets, will be two stories high and the lower floor will be used by the Looney Mercantile company, while the second floor will be equipped with modern office rooms. The Center Ave. store will be occupied by Bryan Bettis of May, who plans to open a dry goods store here; by the Brownwood Optical company, and one other store will be provided which is not yet leased. Dr. Brown will open a drug store in one of the store rooms in the new building.

The rebuilding of this big block of buildings, together with the construction of the store building by J. L. King will replace all the burned area from the big fire of two years ago.

FINE SHOWING MADE IN FINAL REPORT ON WATER AND SEWER MANAGEMENT

FIGURES SHOW THERE HAS BEEN
SAVING IN VARIOUS WAYS FOR
THE CITY OF BROWNWOOD.

An interesting item in connection
with the annual report of Retiring
City Manager A. C. Bratton, is that
included in the work or administra-
tion of the city water mains, espe-
cially the features that pertain to pro-
viding fire protection and water ser-
vice to that portion of Brownwood
south of Coggins and west of Austin
avenue. For this improvement the
city manager purchased seven car-
loads of 6-inch Class B, standard make
Bell and Spigot, C. I. Water pipe, 157
tons delivered at \$50.30 per ton and
by prompt action saved the city of
Brownwood \$7,000 per ton or a total of
\$13,091. The city manager, Mr. Brat-
ton, so arranged the contract that the
city could get the benefit of the 10
per cent reduction in the matter of
freight rates, if the same went into
effect on July 1. On completion of the
laying of the sewer service mains,
the contract was let for the ditching,
for the two miles of water trench,
four feet deep at 9 cents per foot,
which was a clear saving of 100 per
cent, as compared with the work had
it been undertaken by hand.

The cost of this 11,000 feet of 6-inch
water pipe laid was \$1.08 per foot or
42 cents per foot less than it would
have actually cost had a contract for
laying the same been let, which meant
a saving of \$4,620 by laying and su-
perintending the same. The city
manager set 9 fire hydrants along this
line giving fire protection to that part
of the city in which the hydrants are
located, particularly south of Coggins
avenue, where very little water and no
fire protection had previously been
available.

Meters.

Old meters repaired and reset, 194.
New meters set, 192; new meters
purchased, 101; new water taps made,
81; total water taps, 2,343; live water
taps, 2,078.

It was stated in the report that a
large number of old account had been
collected, some of which had been
running since 1920. There is now only
a small number of these old ac-
counts still outstanding. There was
pumped during the year 274,935.78
gallons of water at a cost of \$11,749.15.
This includes the cost of sulphates of
alumina for settling and chlorine gas
for purification, making an average
cost of 1,000 gallons delivered in the
city mains, 4.23 of which was sold 75
per cent of the water pumped. The
total revenue from this source was
\$20,000.65. Total expense, \$20,672.07.
Net gain, \$19,322.58 of which \$22,509.90
was put into new extensions, meters,
fire hydrants, etc. \$372.90 put into new
equipment at pump house.

San Seba Will Have

the State Department of Agricul-

Worth Star-Telegram.

The purpose of this celebration is
to give actual working demon-
strations in pecan building, grafting and
topworking for the benefit of the
boys and girls of San Seba county,
the chief pecan producing county of
the world, in order that the young
people—the men and women of to-
morrow—may learn at first hand that
any intelligent person can do this
important work. Pecan growing will
be one of the chief industries of
Texas within the next ten years, and
every citizen in this banner pro-
duction county should have at least
an elementary knowledge of how the
real work is done.

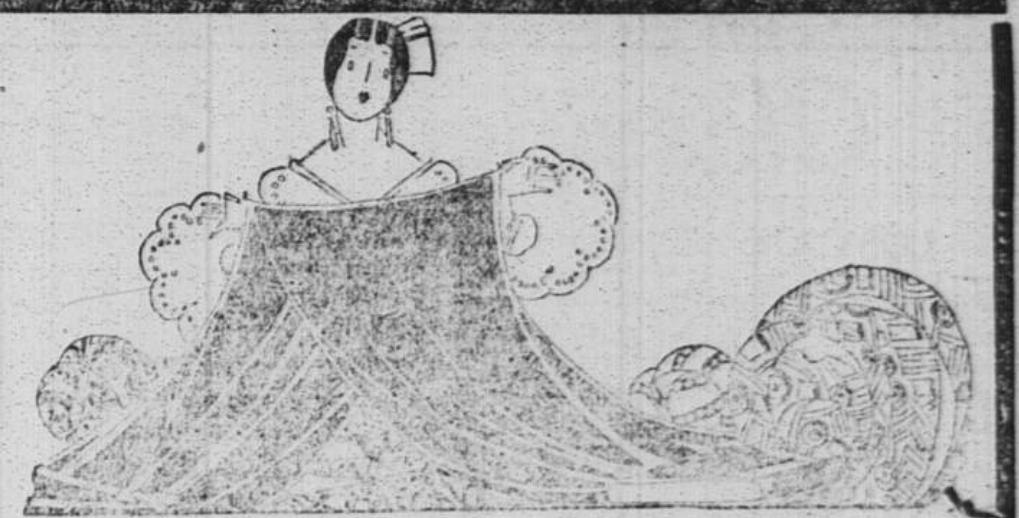
